

JUDGE PAUL HITS MONTGOMERY WARD SEIZURE

Criticizing President Roosevelt as a Attorney-General Francis Biddle for their seizure of the Montgomery Ward plant, Seattle's H. Paul told members of the Washington Republican Club yesterday that the United States can expect "the shortest of force" if its people return the administration to another four years of power.

Paul, Seattle attorney and former King County Superior Court Judge, reviewed facts leading up to the seizure of the Montgomery Ward president, Sewell Avery.

"What do we get from this state of facts with respect to the Democratic Party's idea of government?" Paul asked. "We have a government that administration believes that to enforce its will or its policy, even when there is no individual citizen of due process of law.

"New Deal Principles"

"Men with such a belief, who are in control of the government can be expected to extend that principle—the principle of force to other cases no more justifiable than this case."

"And the issue in this case, therefore, is: Why not put in power a party which will stand for no such nonsense and will insist on the government with due regard to civil liberties as guaranteed by the Constitution?"

Crash Laid to Poor Brakes, Quick Stop

Poor brakes and a quick stop were responsible for an accident involving two Seattle Transit System buses about 2 o'clock this morning at Fourth and Pike streets, police said.

He said merely that it didn't cut out and didn't cut in.

At the Ford offices only one statement was associated with the company.

Feet Hurt? Higher Shoes Ordered Troops In Ward Seizure—Taylor

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Wayne C. Taylor, undersecretary of commerce, testified today he requested troops to seize Montgomery Ward & Co.'s Chicago plant only on instructions from superior government officials.

Taylor told the special House committee investigating the seizure that he had been consulting with Taylor, executive assistant to Attorney-General Biddle, informed him "the use of the plant had been authorized by telephone" with the Secretary of Commerce Jesse Jones, Undersecretary of War Patterson and with Biddle.

Firm Possession Sought

Taylor said the decision was reached in order that the government would be "firmly established" in possession of the plant.

Forty-four soldiers were assigned to the task after Sewell Avery, Ward board chairman, refused to recognize the authority of United States marshals.

Taylor testified that a lieutenant in command of the detachment stated when he arrived his instructions were to remove Avery immediately.

"I corrected him immediately by saying that I had not given any orders to remove Mr. Avery from the premises," Taylor asserted, adding that after Avery's removal to a cooperative he became necessary to order him to leave or be carried out.

"I was very desirous to leave and he would do so only if he was forced to," Taylor said.

Taylor continued, he then instructed Avery's election.

Postal Charge Answered

A company complaint that the Postoffice Department refused to mail letters today designed to bring brought a reply by Tom C. Gargill, deputy first assistant postmaster-general.

Gargill told the committee the mail-order firm always called for its mail, hiring trucking contractors sworn with the postoffice oath. When the strike started, he added the truckers refused to go through the picket lines. Ward's asked the postoffice to deliver its first-class mail and this was refused.

"We have a policy for many years, designed to keep us out of trouble and also to protect the mail," Gargill said. "That policy is to give a plant the same service during a strike it got before the strike. We did just that in this case."

2 R. O. T. C. Cadets Named to Annapolis

Galbraith, 17, is the son of Commander H. Galbraith, U. S. N., and entered the University in 1942. The appointments were two of 12 awarded in a competitive state-wide competition at the U. S. N. R. O. T. C. units throughout the country. Galbraith placed sixth in the national competition and Nelson eighth.

Never Got Used to Gunfire, Says Veteran From Anzio

Listening to news flashes reporting the Allied thrust inland from the Anzio beachhead the fifth regiment, which landed on the beachhead in the Italian peninsula, declared that he never got used to the gunfire, when asked if he wished he were back taking part in the long-expectant war.

U. S. 'Pampers' Nazi Prisoners, Says Russian

By DAVID M. NICHOL, Chicago Daily News Foreign Service Editor, MOSCOW, May 25.—An astonishing and criticism about the treatment of German war prisoners in the United States camp expressed to a "observer," writing in the New York Times.

Drawing on reports in the Soviet press, he informs the American public that German prisoners in Lewis, Wash., were permitted to arrange a demonstration on Hitler's birthday, even to raise the Nazi flag.

Part Lewis Version

(Fort Lewis authorities announced April 22, following the information that the Russian writer Evgeny Zolotarev had written a book of war at the camp were put on a diet of bread and water for the day that they had run up a Nazi flag within their stockade in celebration of Hitler's birthday.

When prepared for a "holiday feast" for the prisoners, it was announced, the prisoners were told that when authorized, they were to raise the Nazi flag.

Zolotarev, 35 years old, was sent home under the Army's plan of repatriating its overseas personnel.

"I really didn't have to talk," he explained. "Home was what everybody was thinking about anyway."

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WRIGHT BUILT 20,000 PLANES

NEW YORK, May 25.—(AP)—Nearly 20,000 airplanes have been produced by the Curtiss-Wright Corporation's warplane division since the war effort began as a defense program, the company reported yesterday.

Burdette S. Wright, vice president of the division, said 18,700 planes came out of six plants between January 1, 1938, and December 31, 1943, he said, 6,000 were built before Pearl Harbor.

"The company's aircraft production factors now are concentrating on C-46 Commando transports, Navy dive-bombers and Army fighters, although they also have turned out a variety of other types."
